**Dr. Betty Leask** is an associate professor in internationalization at the University of South Australia (UniSA). She has built an international reputation, based on research and publications, in the area of internationalization of the curriculum, and is frequently invited to provide keynotes, lectures, and workshops. She is a highly sought-after speaker in Europe, Canada, the United States, and Australia. She is also the author of numerous publications, including her recent conceptual



guide to internationalization, "Internationalisation of the curriculum (IoC) in action."

Betty Leask focuses on linking theory and practice with institutional strategy, teaching, learning, and research, as well as the integration of international and domestic students into learning environments both inside and outside of the classroom. She served on the advisory group for the 2010 publication, "Finding Common Ground: enhancing interaction between domestic and international students: Guide for academics." An Australian National Teaching Fellow, she co-edits the "Journal of Studies in International Education" with Hans de Wit. She is also a visiting professor at Leeds Metropolitan University in the UK and a member of the Scientific Committee of the Centre for Higher Education Internationalisation at the *Universita Cattolica del Sacre Cuore* in Milan. In 2010, Leask was awarded a Teaching Fellowship by the Australian Government that was focused on research into internationalization of the curriculum in different disciplinary and institutional contexts. She has been an elected member of the International Education Association of Australia (IEAA) Board since 2006 and was founding chair of the Association's Internationalisation of the Curriculum Special Interest Group. She is currently chair of the Research Committee.

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
